Medical Outreach

- First Medical Mission for Border Buddies
- Set up clinics in three schools:
 - Fuerzas Armadas School for 2.5 days
 - Venezuela School 1.5 days
 - Santa Margarita School 1.5 days
- 1371 patients visits over 7 works days (some long half days and long full days)
- 89 joint and soft tissue injections

Conditions seen

- Many healthy people with a lot of complaints (free meds)
- Upper respiratory infection 274
- Hypertension 94
- Arthritis 72
- Low Back Pain71
- Bronchitis 66
- Sinusitis 63
- Otitis Media 55

- Dermatitis = 54
- Rhinitis = 42
- Headache = 40

Conditions Seen

- Occasional Acutely III patient-
 - Young boy with fever, cough, and rales (pneumonia) brought in evening as we were closing- given IM ceftriaxone and oral azithromycin–Dad stopped next day or two very appreciative
 - 4-5 month child with tachypnea and tachycardia, respiratory distress. Mom refused suggestion to take child to hospital. Had been there before

Pharmacy

- Took donated meds from two local (US) pharmacies- Market St Apothecary and Quinlan's in Montour Falls
- Purchased some drugs at pharmacy cost to take
- Ran out of injectable steroids in 1-2 days- lots of arthritic pain
- At least three trips to local Honduran pharmacy to replenish supplies

Pharmacy

- 1,457 prescriptions were dispensed to patients at no charge.
- Prescription meds included antibiotics, antihypertensives, and diabetic meds.
- Non-prescription meds included vitamins, Pedialyte, acetaminophen, naproxen, etc.

Lab and X-Ray

 <u>Laboratory</u> :25 laboratory tests were performed including urinalysis and fingerstick blood glucose performed onsite, as well as referral for TSH, potassium, and complete blood counts. (cost paid by BBM)

• <u>X-rays</u> :2 patients were sent for radiology examinations (paid for by BBM)
